So..our web site is up and running and should soon be moved, without any interruption, to our new hosting company's servers.

Walt Spencer introduced our guest demonstrator for the day, Kirk DeHeer, who came to us from Craft Supply in Provo, Utah. DeHeer put to rest the old axiom "Those who can, do. Those who can't, teach." He obviously takes great pleasure in turning, and clearly explains each step of what he is doing. (Note the clean environment.)

Kirk held the attention of 64 members and guests from 9:00 a.m. through 3:30 p.m.



The first piece on the lathe was a basic spindle that illustrated work with a skew.



During a break for lunch we were treated to the Show & Tell display. In the foreground there are 6 donations for Beads of Courage.



After the lunch break, DeHeer created a platter, and then air brushed layers of color on one side.

He placed stencils of leaves on top of the first colors, and then coated the entire back surface in black. As he removed each of the stencils a multicolored leaf appeared. All of this work was done before he shaped the inside of the platter.





Here Kirk is shaping the inside of the platter. Now you can see a very productive day's worth of sawdust at his feet.

Once that was complete, he placed just one stencil on the inside, taped it off, and air-brushed color to create a hint of the design on the reverse.
