March 9, 2019 General Meeting

The 38 members attending this meeting learned that the PAW website is in transition to a new host. (FYI, the transition is now complete and the website is functioning well.)

Wayne Hunt collected donations for the Kiwanis Auction (see picture later in this Newsletter).

Member Jim Sexton described the process he uses to create turning blanks using Alumalite. He showed us the corrugated plastic material he uses to make molds. After mixing the Alumalite and filling the mold, the mixture is inserted into a pressure pot to cure at 45 psi for about 2 hours. He stresses that it is necessary to use a release agent on the mold, something he learned after chipping away at a mold to get at the blank.

Once the piece is turned to pen size, Jim uses micro-mesh followed by polish to finish the piece.

April 13 General Meeting



The April General Meeting featured our own Dick Kelly, who instructed us on creating the boxes he shows us here.

The base, top rim and lid are all turned, but the body of the container, the "secret ingredient" if you will, is a piece of PVC pipe. Kelly demonstrated the application of glue to the pipe and then applied fabric in a

child-friendly design. After drying, the fabric is coated with ModPodge. Dick completed the demo by turning the base, top and lid.

The time Dick spent preparing for this demonstration and creating detailed handout was apparent.

RON LAYPORT

When I started turning a few years ago, I was already carving small fish, birds and bugs. So I looked for turners who were also combining turning with carving. It didn't take me long to find Ron Layport, and he has remained my favorite turner/carver since. After designing and building one-of-a-kind furniture and an award-winning forty-year career in advertising, Ron was introduced to turning by David Ellsworth and began turning wooden vessels in 1992. His work is instantly recognizable and was featured in the Merging Exhibit at the 2015 AAW Symposium. 
Per Bruce Butler: The trip to Portland was so much fun - just like being back in college:
