General Meeting September 12, 2020

This was the first meeting, after COVID-19 distancing, to be held back at the YEI building. 29 of us gathered that day.

Today was the final day to collect donated bowls for the 2020 Empty Bowls Event. Although held without personal contact, word is that the organizers collected a significant amount for area food banks. Bruce Potter is in charge of collecting for this charity. He will accept bowls at any upcoming meeting.

The program for today was given by Chad Schimmel of Turner's Warehouse in Gilbert, AZ. His demonstration was all about working with resins. He brought examples of the items he sells at Turner's Warehouse.





Chad talked about the differences in quality of various pressure pots. He did two pour

demonstrations. He noted that the elevation of Prescott made for shorter working time.



General Meeting October 10, 2020

Prescott Area Woodturners met at the YEI building in the Prescott Airpark on October 10, 2020. President Barry Walter called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

After a brief business meeting there was time for a few Show & Tell items. These are always a highlight.



The program for this meeting could be called either a Mini-Symposium or Woodturning Snapshots. Instead of stations set up around the YEI building, there was one platform used in turn by six individuals.



First up was our resident expert on pen making, Barry Walter. Barry showed the parts used in pen making and explained why

he chooses some over others. Bottom line: you get what you pay for.

Barry quickly stowed his material in the next room.

Then Dan Hall took over the stage area. Dan showed us the steps he takes to carve leaf designs over a

vessel. He first traces leaves onto the surface, then uses a power

carver. Working from the center out toward the edges, he textures the top of the leaf then undercuts the edges. Wood burning creates shadows.



When Gary Frank took over the stage, he shared his method for making sanding disks - a cost-effective way to create a tool often used in the shop. He showed us a whole tray of graduated sizes of blocks. Gary then retired to the next room.

A break was declared, and folks went into the middle room of the facility, where the first three demonstrators had set up displays of their work. This allowed members to see the pieces up close,



handle them and ask questions. But there was only 15 minutes allowed for this break, because three more demonstrators were about to take their turns.

Before beginning the second session of demonstrations, Barry Walter introduced Susan Murphy as our new Website Coordinator. Previously known by PAW members chiefly as the mother of our three teen turners, Susan's day job has her managing Microsoft 365 for Yavapai County Employees. Helping her with the website will be Heidi DeFazio. Their skills are most welcome!



Don Milburn began the second half of demonstrations, first with descriptions of carbide tips, then with instruction on sharpening these expensive additions to our shops. He demonstrated gliding the tips over a diamond card. Don illustrated safely handling these sharpened carbide tips with personal experience: he once cut the palm of his hand when tapping the sharp tool against it.

For Wayne Hunt, turning has evolved mainly into segmenting. He told about learning segmenting at Ed Jones' shop after Tuesday breakfasts. He showed some of the jigs they all made during those sessions. His latest bowls are created with segments missing.



Then Jim Winge set out this array of tools that he has created. There



is a story attached to each of these. Many have been in use in Jim's shop for years. One is even

adapted from a saw that belonged to Jim's father.

After Jim talked about his tools a second break was called. Folks came forward and/or moved into the middle area so that they could see up close the items each presenter displayed.

The day ran longer than some, but interest was intense from beginning to end.

She will be happy to check out your choice and/or to check it back in again.

PAW Library News

During the past few months, woodturners have had opportunities to watch turning demonstrations during the AAW Symposium, the Woodturners Worldwide Symposium, and last week, an AAW demo by David Ellsworth. This wealth of resources has provided many ideas for projects to try, many techniques to make some processes easier, and many lessons for skill development for beginner to advanced turners.

I appreciated the chance to watch some of the demos more than once and the chance to pause and try a certain technique. For example, I had avoided choosing the skew as a tool for projects until we watched Jim Echter's skew class during the Woodturners Worldwide Symposium. He patiently taught the six basic cuts that can be practiced and eventually mastered with a skew. Ken and I took the computer to the shop and stopped the demo at the end of each part of the lesson so I could have my first experiences with the skew. Although it will take a lot of practice, I'm no longer afraid of including the skew in the tools I'd use on projects. I can still hear Jim's preface to each instruction, "While you are learning..." It made me think of how project oriented we often are. We make a bowl or a pen or vase. For novices like me though, it's also okay to just enjoy learning and practicing new skills. Watching demos or DVDs helps provide those chances to learn.

The PAW Library has some videos and books by some of the symposium presenters that can be checked out during the monthly meetings. We recently added the David Ellsworth book to our collection. If you enjoyed his AAW demo, this book may give you more ideas and information. He includes a chapter on the importance of body mechanics and stretching when woodturning. We also have DVDs by Glenn Lucas and Mike Mahoney showing how to make platters and bowls and by Cindy Drozda showing how to make finials. In addition, we have many other books and DVDs that may give you new ideas or techniques to try. Explore our library to find something that may interest you.

Now I only need a video on sanding, more sanding and avoiding so much sanding...
