Kiwanis Auction

This auction is a piece of Prescott history that has been watched and listened to by generations of Prescottonians. It's a tradition for the folks in the Prescott area to tune in and bid on items, not so much for the deal, but to be part of this annual event that raises money for the kids of our communities. PAW members have donated pieces for this auction for many years.

Empty Bowls

Empty Bowls is a fundraiser for local food banks, for which local ceramic and wood artisans donate "empty" bowls. In 2020 the event was done as a drive-through. PAW contributed more than 100 bowls and was mentioned in the Daily Courier article printed on November 1, 2020, recapping the success of the event. Empty Bowls donated \$2,000 to St. Vincent DePaul, a charity that our Dennis & Carolyn Egan support by delivering meals every Monday. Bowls donated for this event are collected at every PAW meeting.

Beads of Courage

Beads of Courage, Inc. is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them through an Arts-in-Medicine Program.

Patients are given a bead for each procedure undergone; sadly, some children have enough beads for a string longer than they are tall. PAW members create unique lidded containers that are given to patients in this program, to be used to store the beads they earn. It is our hope that the child will fully recover and keep their BoC box for display in their grown-up home.

The pandemic has made visits to patients difficult, but we will receive pictures of the recipient and her/his special box as soon as visits can resume.

your choice and/or to check it back in again.

PAW Library News

There were eight books added to our library this past month thanks to a donation by John Garner.

- A question often asked when looking at someone's project is: 'What did you
 use for finish?' Two of the donated books pertain to finishing wood and
 perhaps will offer some guidance: <u>Understanding Wood Finishing</u> by Bob
 Flexner and <u>Complete Woodfinishing</u> by Ian Hosker.
- The library didn't have any books on penmaking so two books now fill that gap: <u>Pens from the Wood Lathe</u> by Dick Sing and <u>Turning Pens and Desk</u> <u>Accessories</u> by Jeffrey Snyder.
- The <u>Good Wood Handbook</u> by Albert Jackson and David Day helps with wood identification and characteristics and has photo examples of woods in color.
- Three of the books give woodturning techniques and project ideas:
 <u>Woodturning with Ray Allen</u> by Dale Nish focuses on segmenting;
 <u>Woodturning</u> and <u>Woodturning Techniques</u> by Woodturning Magazine both have a variety of projects.

In the March/April PAW newsletter, I referred to an article found at Kent Weakley's website, 'turnabowl.com,' that gave woodturning wisdom Kent had learned from Glenn Lucas. When another PAW member told me about some YouTube videos he'd been enjoying from 'the turnabowl channel,' the site sounded familiar and I remembered browsing that website while writing my article.

(https://turnawoodbowl.com/) He inspired me to look at the YouTube videos on Kent's channel and I found them to be informative and well done. Whether you enjoy making pens, bowls, containers or other turned objects, there are a variety of topics on that channel that may be helpful to you. The one that caught my attention first was about avoiding 'spectacular tool marks.' There are videos on

sharpening tools, working with 'rock hard' woods, and using jam chucks or tenons, as well as many topics pertaining to bowl making. When you want to learn something new, try a few of the 60 videos on Kent's channel at https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCDwV2Djnj756vpxL51zd4Uw/videos.
