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President's Message



Welcome to 2022! Now is the time for reflection and a look forward to the new year.

Recall that one year ago our January monthly meeting was only on the internet because of COVID-19 concerns. As the year progressed, and COVID concerns diminished, we started hybrid monthly meetings held in-person at YEI and simultaneously broadcast via the internet by using Zoom software. This allowed members to choose for themselves how they wanted to attend meetings and stay in contact with other members, either in-person or virtual. For members' benefit, the club will continue hybrid meetings in 2022. We also started 'Chips & Grits' discussions via Zoom last year to allow members to share experiences online about various woodturning issues and topics. Chips & Grits will also continue in 2022.

In the past, the club arranged for two professional woodturner demonstrations per year at additional cost per attendee. Last year the club provided three professional woodturner demonstrations via interactive remote demonstrations (IRDs) at no cost to members. We watched demonstrations by Pat Carroll, Trent Bosch, and Mike Mahoney broadcast from their own shops in Ireland, Colorado, and California, respectively. Members at YEI, and online, were able to ask

questions during the demos and get responses in real time. The club has arranged for three IRDs this year by other professional woodturners. The first IRD will be in March so watch for details. These IRDs will again be paid by your annual dues without additional cost to members.

This past year also saw the resumption of club-supported sales events, including a sale on the courthouse plaza in May, the Holiday sale in November, and the Stocking Stuffer sale in December. 2022 will again include club-supported sales, although some of the venues may change. Please watch for more details.

The informal Tuesday morning breakfasts also resumed last year at BackBurner restaurant and will continue in 2022. Unfortunately, the Tuesday demonstrations at member's shops did not happen last year. The club is planning to resume these informal club-supported demos this year. Details will be announced as the year progresses.

Despite the pandemic last year, club members continued to donate their time and materials to local charitable programs and organizations including Beads of Courage, Empty Bowls, and the Kiwanis Auction. I hope that all club members will begin this new year by turning and donating items for these and other worthwhile organizations that benefit our local community.

I suspect that COVID concerns will continue in 2022 but believe the changes we implemented will let everyone participate in club events, either in person or on line, so that we will continue to share ideas and learn techniques to let the natural beauty of wood emerge and turn into beautiful things.

WHAT SAFETY PROCEDURES SHOULD WE FOLLOW USING A WOOD LATHE...

- 1. Eye Protection, Glasses, Goggles face shield. Protect yourself from flying chips.
- 2. Hearing Protection: that is suitable for the noise level.
- 3. Wear RESPIRATORY protection when sanding.
- 4. Work in well lighted area.
- 5. Before the Lathe is turned on, make sure all clamps & fittings are secure & that the workpiece is free to turn.

Kiwanis Auction

This auction is a piece of Prescott history that has been watched and listened to by generations of Prescottonians. It's a tradition for the folks in the Prescott area to tune in and bid on items, not so much for the deal, but to be part of this annual event that raises money for the kids of our communities. PAW members have donated pieces for this auction for many years.

Empty Bowls

Empty Bowls is a fundraiser for local food banks, for which local ceramic and wood artisans donate "empty" bowls. In 2020 the event was done as a drive-through. PAW contributed more than 100 bowls and was mentioned in the Daily Courier article printed on November 1, 2020, recapping the success of the event. Empty Bowls donated \$2,000 to St. Vincent DePaul, a charity that our Dennis & Carolyn Egan support by delivering meals every Monday. PAW donated 112 bowls in 2021. Bowls donated for this event are collected at every PAW meeting.

Beads of Courage

Beads of Courage, Inc. is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them through an Arts-in-Medicine Program.

Patients are given a bead for each procedure undergone; sadly, some children have enough beads for a string longer than they are tall. PAW members create unique lidded containers that are given to patients in this program, to be used to store the beads they earn. It is our hope that the child will fully recover and keep their BoC box for display in their grown-up home.

The pandemic has made visits to patients difficult, but we will receive pictures of the recipient and her/his special box as soon as visits can resume.
