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#### **President's Message**



I am happy to report that the Mountain Artists Guild (MAG) sale and club promotion event in May was a great success! The new location on the sidewalk along Gurley Street was ideal to receive a lot of traffic past the sales area which helped create the highest total sales revenue of any past PAW sales event. In addition, the location was perfect for two full days of public demonstrations to show how much fun the art of woodturning can be. The look on children's faces was very rewarding as they watched plain pieces of wood turn into fun and beautiful objects. Every club member should try demonstrating sometime to see

how people, both children and adults, react so positively to woodturning.

The club has reserved this same great location on the Plaza for the August MAG sale and will add an additional 10'x10' sales canopy to allow for PAW sellers to have more space for their artwork. I am optimistic that this event will go well again and hope that the monsoon season weather will cooperate with our desire for pleasant weather and large crowds. Watch for details before the event and please volunteer to participate in some way. Help is always needed for the equipment transport, setup, and takedown. At the very least, please come down to the event to see how your club is reaching out to the public to promote woodturning as an art.

The club's first sale and demonstration at the Prescott Farmer's Market was also a great success in June. This half-day event exposed the local clientele to our club and to woodturning. The sale items were all donated by club members and resulted in over \$500 of sales, an amount much higher than expected, that will benefit the club treasury to continue promoting the art of woodturning. Turning demonstrations were again well received by the public audience. Because

of this first-time success, the club will again be a 'Guest Artist' at the Farmers Market in October. Watch for details as the date approaches.

PAW will have items on display at the Prescott Valley Public Library for the entire month of August to promote our club and let library patrons see the beautiful items that can be created with a lathe. There will be no sales at the library but this is a good opportunity to let another group of local citizens know about our club and to promote our annual Holiday Sale in November and Stocking Stuffer Sale in December. Items for this display will be collected at the July Monthly General Meeting and volunteers are needed to help set up and take down the display items. Please consider providing an item that will be returned to you at the end of the display period. I hope that all club members will take the time to visit the library during August to see for themselves how our club is promoting the art and craft of woodturning.

The annual Potluck Picnic was held in June at the YEI building where everyone enjoyed pulled pork sandwiches, potluck dishes, and the chance to socialize with woodturning friends. Many thanks to Marge Hunt for organizing this club event.

Tuesday Demonstrations in members' shops were restarted in March and have continued every month since then with plans to continue monthly through the rest of the year. These are great opportunities to visit other members' shops, learn new techniques and skills, and get to know other woodturners. The Chips & Grits online discussions via Zoom have also continued every month and provide an opportunity to share tips, techniques, and lessons learned with other woodturners. Both the Tuesday Demos and Chips & Grits online discussions serve slightly different purposes for the exchange of information and I encourage all club members to try both of these venues. There is a wealth of experience and information shared between members through these informal club activities.

Stay tuned for more great monthly meetings coming up. July will be our annual Tool Sale, supplemented this year with an opportunity to photograph your woodturned items with professional equipment and lighting. The August meeting will have our next Interactive Remote Demonstration (IRD) with professional turner Rudy Lopez and our third IRD for the year will happen in November when Glenn Lucas shares his skills from his shop. Watch for details.

All of the activities and events described above require people who volunteer their time, effort, and knowledge to make these activities happen. Finally, as before, I encourage everyone to continue to make items for donation to the Empty Bowls event, Beads of Courage program, and the annual Kiwanis auction. These charitable organizations help our community and your donations let you keep improving your woodturning skills while simultaneously helping others.

### PAW General Meeting May 21, 2022

Today's demonstrator was our own Phil Brown, who spoke about embellishment.

Phil has been embellishing his pieces for a long time. Once, when he asked a buyer why his pieces were never chosen, the buyer replied that he felt Phil's embellishments "screwed up a good piece of wood." Nowadays Phil likes to use that phrase as a definition of what he does.



Phil uses graph paper to plan the intricate pattern on his "woven" pieces. He pointed out that trying to free-hand the design around a platter can result in an unfortunate gap instead of design-meeting-design as envisioned.

To illustrate the many types of embellishing, Phil used pictures of his own work as well as that of his mentors and many others in this club. He likes to try new things, and is often inspired by demonstrations given by professionals.



## Tuesday Demo May 24, 2022

Phil Brown invited the group to attend a hands-on demo at his shop at 1360 Solar Heights Drive in Prescott on Tuesday May 24 at about 9:00 a.m. following Tuesday Breakfast at the Back Burner Restaurant. Phil showed the process he uses for planning the design on beaded platters. He also showed various other forms of embellishment.

### Farmer's Market June 11, 2022

PAW was invited to be "Artist in Residence" at the Prescott Farmers Market on June 11, 2022. This was a first for the club. Event Chairman Dean Humphrey set this in motion, beginning with using his personal trailer to haul equipment from

## Kiwanis Auction

This auction is a piece of Prescott history that has been watched and listened to by generations of Prescottonians. It's a tradition for the folks in the Prescott area to tune in and bid on items, not so much for the deal, but to be part of this annual event that raises money for the kids of our communities. PAW members have donated pieces for this auction for many years.

### **Empty Bowls**

*Empty Bowls* is a fundraiser for local food banks, for which local ceramic and wood artisans donate "empty" bowls. In 2020 the event was done as a drive-through. PAW contributed more than 100 bowls and was mentioned in the Daily Courier article printed on November 1, 2020, recapping the success of the event. Empty Bowls donated \$2,000 to St. Vincent DePaul, a charity that our Dennis & Carolyn Egan support by delivering meals every Monday. PAW donated 112 bowls in 2021. Bowls donated for this event are collected at every PAW meeting.

# **Beads of Courage**

**Beads of Courage, Inc.** is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them through an Arts-in-Medicine Program.

Patients are given a bead for each procedure undergone; sadly, some children have enough beads for a string longer than they are tall. PAW members create unique lidded containers that are given to patients in this program, to be used to store the beads they earn. It is our hope that the child will fully recover and keep their BoC box for display in their grown-up home.

The pandemic has made visits to patients difficult, but we will receive pictures of the recipient and her/his special box as soon as visits can resume.
