Jay Loden set up and manned a photo booth. Members brought examples of their work and Jay took photos. The photos were sent to the artist and also to Susan Murphy to be added to the Gallery section of our website. However, Susan cautioned folks that photos would ONLY be displayed if the artist had submitted a short biography to accompany the display.

Display at Prescott Valley Public Library August 9 through September 8, 2022



The month-long display of PAW members' items at the Prescott Valley Public Library was well received by library patrons and provided us with a new venue to promote the club. Members provided 54 items that showed a variety of woodturning styles and techniques. There were no sales at the library but it was a good opportunity to let local citizens know about our club and to promote future demonstration and sale events planned for the rest of the year. This display fit well with the purpose of PAW to "...inform, educate and foster the art and craft of lathe-turning..." (*Bylaws, Article II*).

President Ken Allen sent the following to the Editor of the AAW magazine:

"Dear Editor,

The Prescott Area Woodturners (PAW), an AAW chapter in Prescott, Arizona, has promoted the art of woodturning by giving woodturning demonstrations several times each year at local outdoor community events. Rudy demonstrated how to turn a natural edge wing bowl from a green half-log crotch section. He explained his techniques well and pointed out some tool control ideas

needed to turn the very thin 1/8-inch-thick walls on his bowl. As he was finishing the bottom, I think most of us in the audience were on the edge of our seats anticipating that he would turn through the very thin bottom to turn his bowl into a

'funnel'. Fortunately, he was skilled enough to avoid that mistake.

His demonstration was excellent and we may invite him back again sometime in the future.



Kiwanis Auction

This auction is a piece of Prescott history that has been watched and listened to by generations of Prescottonians. It's a tradition for the folks in the Prescott area to tune in and bid on items, not so much for the deal, but to be part of this annual event that raises money for the kids of our communities. PAW members have donated pieces for this auction for many years.

Empty Bowls

Empty Bowls is a fundraiser for local food banks, for which local ceramic and wood artisans donate "empty" bowls. In 2022 PAW donated 73 bowls. Bowls donated for this event are collected at every PAW meeting.

Beads of Courage

Beads of Courage, Inc. is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness, their families, and the clinicians who care for them through an Arts-in-Medicine Program.

Patients are given a bead for each procedure undergone; sadly, some children have enough beads for a string longer than they are tall. PAW members create unique lidded containers that are given to patients in this program, to be used to store the beads they earn. It is our hope that the child will fully recover and keep their BoC box for display in their grown-up home.

The pandemic has made visits to patients difficult, but we will receive pictures of the recipient and her/his special box as soon as visits can resume.

I enjoy sharing some resources in the library column that go beyond our PAW library materials. Two of our members shared some things that caught my interest and hopefully they will also be appreciated by other club members.

Jay Loden shared a link to a YouTube video in which Patrick Sullivan tested a variety of woods to see if gluing end grain woods together would be stronger or weaker than gluing side grains together. Since I enjoy mysteries, Marge Hunt recommended a novel that has a female woodturner as the protagonist. The book doesn't give many woodturning tips, but it was enjoyable to have woodturning occur during the progression of the story.
