On the first day of his two-day class, students create their own blank. Here Ric Davis is showing the remainder of the blank he created for the platter he produced in one of Forsha's classes.



Safety Coordinator Dan Hall talked about Safety Glasses. Many kinds of safety glasses are available, but it is important that they be rated ANSI I SEA Z87.1. Whichever kind you choose, they should cover the side of the eye. Dan suggested making it a habit to don safety glasses whenever you enter your shop.

Heidi Defazio will present a two-day Christmas Ornament workshop on September 16 and 17, 2023..She brought examples for Show & Tell. The Show & Tell section of the program is always inspiring!

This month I will talk a little about **wood toxicity**. It doesn't matter if the wood is exotic or domestic or even if it has a pleasant smell, it can still be toxic. Wood dust is always bad for you. Some reactions to wood can include rashes, eye irritation, respiratory problems, headaches, nausea and even dizziness. Long term exposure can lead to developing allergies or even nose and sinus cancer. Treated wood and some exotics can be poisonous. Google any wood you are unsure of to check its toxicity.

Be careful of any f.o.g. (Found On Ground) wood. I had a piece that had poison ivy wrapped around it. The best cure is always prevention. Use a dust mask or respirator, dust collector, and limit skin exposure. Long tight-fitting sleeves, gloves and changing clothes followed by a shower if you have any symptoms or know the wood is toxic.

Hope I didn't scare you too much...but just enough!
