At this meeting the results of the Logo Committee's work were revealed. The purpose of this committee was to determine the PAW logo going forward. 20 suggestions were considered, and 3 were presented, along with the original logo, for a vote of the membership.

If it looks familiar, that is because the club overwhelmingly voted to retain original logo.



Today's program featured a demonstration by member David Kohler. David likes segmenting because of the colors and designs. He often uses Spectra Ply, lengths of preglued veneer that is available in myriad colors. He showed examples of glue-ups and the jigs he uses.

On the lathe, David had two halves of a vessel glued and attached to separate faceplates which he fastened to the tail stock and the head stock, then pressure fitted together. Turning them together in this manner established the profile on both halves. He could then turn the inside of each half before gluing them together as a finished vessel.

Learning continued on Tuesday May 23, when David offered a close-up, hands-on look at his processes. These **Tuesday Demos** are a valuable club resource.

So many amazing pieces to look at! Our folks do wonderful work!






Woodettes Social Group

First aid kits for the workshop.

You can't have too much in a first aid kit - as long as you can find everything - but these are some things that you should have. Think of them as a base line.

You should have a cell phone handy, with preprogrammed numbers. Call for help if you can.

Things like bandages, disinfectant, sterile pads for putting pressure on a wound, tweezers, scissors, arm-wrist sized tourniquets and eye wash. You can put more in, but remember this is first aid in the shop near your house, not a polar expedition.

Put the kit where you can get to it. The most complete kit will not be helpful if it's on the top shelf and you are laying on the floor.

A phone is really important, and don't hesitate to call for help.

Finally, remember: it's easier to prevent than heal.

Our club library has three large lidded tubs filled with books that have been donated or purchased over the years. Those tubs have been carted into meetings to be available for checkout by our members. However, in this era of YouTube education, few books are checked out each month. In the four years I've been librarian, I've found that many books were donations that have never been checked out. With the agreement of the Board of Directors, I'm going to reduce the library collection to the more recently published books that are of greater interest to our members. I'll retain books that provide fundamental and advanced woodturning tips, books by well-known woodturners, project ideas, and a broad range of topics.

The July PAW meeting will be the tool auction, a time when our members can clean out their extra tools or gather some new ones. I will use this opportunity to 'clean out' the library. I'm planning to have a table at the July meeting with discarded books that will be free for members to take home. (Please don't donate them back once they've been removed from the library.) Any books that are left will be donated to the public library if the librarians are willing to take them.

I have added one new book to our collection this month: <u>Woodturning with Resin</u> by Keith Lackner. It gives tips on using resin with wood, has project ideas and is filled with lots of pictures! Visit the library if you're interested in checking it out.
